Besant, Annie, *Theosophy*, 1912, 94 pages.

Different aspects of Theosophy, are explained in relation to science, morality and art, philosophy, religion, and how it is applied to social problems.

Besant, Annie, *Theosophy and the New Psychology*, 1918, 124 pages.

Presenting a psychology that embraces not only the ordinary states of our mind but also those that could be termed as psychic and spiritual, the author discusses methods of unfolding these higher mental capacities so that each person may experience them.

Blavatsky, H. P., *H.P.B. Teaches: An Anthology*, c1992, 579 pages.

Covering most of the subjects she wrote about, Blavatsky's best articles are compiled by Michael Gomes to serve as a useful introduction for those having no clear idea of what she actually taught.

Blavatsky, H. P., *Isis Unveiled*, 1972, 2 vol.

Madame Blavatsky's first work created a sensation when it was first published in 1877. It was offered as “A master key to the mysteries of ancient and modern science and theology” providing a revolutionary worldview and challenging the “infallibility” of science (vol. Burnier, Radha, *Human Regeneration*, 1990, 150 pages.

A compilation of lectures and discussions about the work of the Theosophical Society, the deeper meaning of its objects, and adhering to an approach in Theosophy that may help bring a fundamental change in humanity.

A collection of articles presented at two seminars on Human Regeneration held at the International Theosophical Centre at Naarden, in Holland.

Codd, Clara, *Trust Yourself to Life*, 1975, 116 pages.

Dealing with questions frequently asked by the thoughtful person, the author shares her views about God and man, death and life, love (both human and divine), in a style that is penetrating and at the same time simple and direct.

Humphreys, Christmas, *The Field of Theosophy: The Teacher, the Teaching and the Way*, 1966, 63 pages.

Three lectures covering three aspects of the Theosophical movement, namely, the life and work of Mme. Blavatsky as the main source of Theosophical teachings, the main concepts found in her monumental work, *The Secret Doctrine*, and the Theosophical path as the application of these teachings to daily life.

Krishnamurti, J., *Education as Service*, 1912, 160 pages.

These are the first teachings of Krishnamurti on education, written when he was still a teenager. Using the same structure of the book *At the Feet of the Master*, the author applies his Master's teachings to a subject that was going to be central to his whole life.

Kulkarni, R. K., *Child Training: In the Light of Theosophy*, c1927, 204 pages.

A collection of articles about education written by leading Theosophists and a few other writers, exploring what constitutes children and how they can best be trained and raised to uncover latent potentials.

Mehta, Rohit, *The Intuitive Philosophy*, 1958, 408 pages.

The mystical aspect of Theosophy is described in the light of J. Krishnamurti's teachings, an approach that aims at working with a mind illumined by the spiritual intuition and that is complementary to the occult approach.

Mills, Joy, *The One True Adventure: Theosophy and the Quest for Meaning*, c2008, 361 pages.

A collection of articles exploring the meaning of life, offered as a guide to the acquisition of wisdom. The essays are grouped to correspond with four stages in the quest: The Human Condition, Our Hidden Potential, Esoteric Teachings, and Self-Transformation.

Parents Theosophical Research Group, *A Theosophical Guide for Parents*, 1981, 165 pages.

Intended for those who feel that the spiritual side of life must be emphasized in raising a family while working towards their own self realization, this guide presents a collection of articles covering subjects such as The Feminine Aspect, The Evolutionary Family, and Education in the Light of Occultism.

Perkins, James S., *A Geometry of Space-Consciousness*, 1986, 147 pages.

A new approach to understanding space, both the physical and the psychological one, describing the geometry of form and the geometry of motion in man's consciousness, as a means of creative self-discovery.

Purucker, G. de, *Golden Precepts of Esotericism*, 1979, 175 pages.

Drawn from the author's talks with students, this book describes in simple language several important aspects of the spiritual life, bringing out particularly the mystical and moral dimensions of his themes, offering inspiration and practical suggestions.

Shearman, Hugh, *Desire and Fulfillment*, 1956, 84 pages.

One of the main problems of the spiritual life is that difficulties arise not so much because we don't know what to do, but because we don't want to do it. The author presents a fresh perspective on desire and emotion in human life and its role in the spiritual life.

Shearman, Hugh, *The Passionate Necessity*, 1962, 135 pages.

A discussion of the quest for truth beyond reason, particularly in religious terms, this book offers a view of human purpose and motive, and of the powerful emotional forces that underlie contemporary human life.

Smith, E. Lester, *Intelligence Came First*, 1990, 221 pages.

A reinterpretation of science refuting the role of blind matter and blind chance in the universe, Smith postulates that consciousness is a fact in nature, and that intelligence is primal, the cosmos being grounded in and pervaded by it.
